Is fracking really dangerous to the environment?

A temporary ban has been placed on fracking in Ohio because of its environmental dangers.

Fracking, or hydraulic fracturing, is a process that involves injecting millions of gallons of water, chemicals, and sand in order to break open rocks and release gases. Fracking has been an environmental concern for some time.

Fracking has caused more than 1,000 documented cases of water contamination in the United States. The hazardous waste waters and toxic chemicals have been having an impact on areas near drilling sights for some time. This is a result of the combination of the toxicity of the chemicals and often occurring accidents or spills.

The dangers of fracking have become

much more than an environmental concern. Many seismologists claim that the recent 4.0-magnitude earthquake on New Year's Eve in Youngstown was caused by fracking in Ohio. The water used to extract natural gasses is the prime cause for the quakes. This water works its way into subterranean faults, and if fracking continues, the pressure can build, causing the fault lines to increase and, ultimately, creating tremors and earthquakes.

Since last spring, Youngstown, Ohio, has had 11 small quakes. The quakes have caused seismologists to investigate while a moratorium is in place to prevent future fracking in the area.

Experts, however, are not entirely sure that the ban on fracking is something that will stop the quakes. Many seismologists predict that the pressure from fracking will continue to create quakes and tremors, regardless of the ban.

"The earthquakes will trickle on as a kind of a cascading process once you've caused them to occur," said John Armbruster of Columbia University's Lamont-Doherty Earth Observatory. "This one year of pumping is a pulse that has been pushed into the ground, and it's going to be spreading out for at least a year."

Other experts, such as Ray Beiersdorfer, a geology professor at Youngstown State University, agree with this prediction and expect the quakes to continue throughout the year.

Regulators in Ohio asked D&L Energy

Inc., a company that carries out fracking near Youngstown, to stop fracking while the investigation continues. The 2.7-magnitude quake on Christmas Eve prompted the sudden ban and investigation. D&L Energy has been fracking in Ohio since December 2010. Since then, fracking has caused 12 earthquakes. Fracking has been conducted in Ohio since 1985, with approximately seven million barrels of water being injected into the earth.

Thomas E. Stewart of the Ohio Oil and Gas Association has agreed with the recent decision to suspend fracking. "We fully support the decision of the Ohio Department of Natural Resources to issue a temporary suspension of five injection wells in the Youngstown area. It was the correct course of action to ensure the safety and peace of mind for area residents."

However, many people insist that fracking is a major help, providing natural resources and jobs that are otherwise not available.

Pittsburgh Mayor Luke Ravenstahl has stated, "[Fracking] is more than just drilling and extracting. There are opportunities up and down the supply chain."

In 2010, the natural-gas industry triggered \$11.2 billion in economic activity in Pennsylvania and created 140,000 jobs and raised over a billion dollars in state and local taxes.

Several experts also disagree with the statement that fracking is the cause of the earthquakes. Experts who disagree claim that the earthquakes were simply flukes, and that fracking has nothing to do with the quakes.

However, the majority of experts say that fracking is, without a doubt, the cause of the quakes. Many seismologists, geologists, and environmental activists have questioned why fracking has just now been banned. Network for Oil and Gas Accountability and Protection president Vanessa Pesec has stated, "It seems remarkable to me that they would not have done something until earthquake 10."

As for their Valentine's Day plans, Barclay won't know until the actual day. Williams plans to surprise her with something fun and romantic!

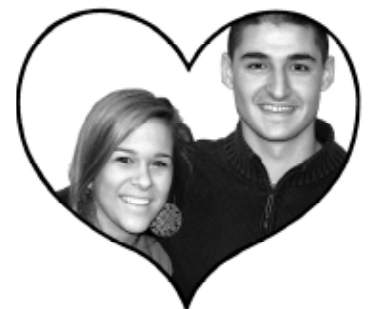
Lorenzo Cugini and Mary Cistone

ARETHA FRANKLIN

Aretha Franklin, often called the “Queen of Soul,” was born in a two-room house in Memphis, Tennessee, in 1942. Her mother had been in many relationships, and her family moved many times. Franklin’s mother died when she was ten years old and was then raised by her grandmother. Franklin then started singing at her church and learned to play the piano by ear. At 18, she released her first single for Columbia Records which reached #10 on the Billboard R&B charts and a year after this, she released her first album. She continued releasing successful singles and scored a Top 40 hit with “Rock-A-Bye Your Baby With a Dixie Melody.” At Atlantic Records Franklin gained more fame and sang her biggest hit “Respect.” In 1980, Franklin appeared in the movie *The Blues Brothers* with Ray Charles and James Brown. She continues to sing and perform while collaborating with many other artists and is still popular today.



STEVIE WONDER

Stevie Wonder was born in Saginaw, Michigan, in 1950, the third of six children. Because he was born six weeks premature, his retinas were not fully attached, and he was blind. Wonder’s mother left with the children for Detroit when he was four years old. This was around the time Stevie started playing instruments and experimenting with music. He played piano, harmonica, drums, and bass; he was also a member of his church’s choir. Wonder was discovered by Ronnie White of the Miracles and was signed by the CEO of Motown Records. At 13, Wonder released “Fingertips” which was a hit. By 20, Wonder had recorded many successful albums and singles, including one with the young Marvin Gaye. Wonder became a well known artist and performed and recorded with Barbra Streisand, Michael Jackson, and Bruce Springsteen. He has performed at many famous events and venues including the Super Bowl and Madison Square Garden. Many of Wonder’s songs were featured in movies, and he has won many awards for his work.



BARACK OBAMA

President Barack Obama was born in Honolulu, Hawaii, in 1961. His mother was born in Kansas while his father was born in Kenya. Obama’s first years of schooling took place at local schools in Jakarta, Indonesia. At 10, Obama returned to Honolulu to live with his grandparents on his mother’s side. As a senator, Obama helped gain support for legislation reforming ethics and health care. In 2008, Obama ran and was elected as the 44th president of the United States and is working on his campaign for the 2012 presidential election...



DENZEL WASHINGTON

Denzel Washington was born in Mount Vernon, New York, in 1954. His mother was a beauty parlor owner and operator and his father was an ordained Pentecostal minister. When Washington was 14, he was sent to Oakland Military Academy after his parents split up. There he was given lead roles and received a scholarship to the American Conservatory Theatre in San Francisco. A year later, he returned to New York and began his professional acting career. Some of his most famous movies are *Remember the Titans*, *Malcolm X*, and *The Book of Eli*.

1. U.S. Marines sanctioned

Four U.S. Marines in Afghanistan were video taped urinating on the bodies of dead insurgents. After this incident, General Curtis Scaparrotti said, "We must treat the living and the dead with dignity and respect." He said troops must follow the rules of armed conflict and act honorably at all times. "In order to prevail, for the good of the coalition nations and the Afghan people, we can do no less," he said. The video surfaced during a crucial time of the war as the U.S. and the Taliban were beginning to take steps towards peace by withdrawing troops from the nation in upcoming years. The directive notes that "defiling, desecrating, mocking, photographing or filming for personal use of any dead insurgent constitutes a grave breach" of the Armed-Conflict Laws. It also violates "basic standards of human decency and can cause serious damage to relations with the Afghan government." The nature of the investigation allows for the possibility of court martials and further investigation in regard to any men involved with the video.

2. Corpse found on Royal Estate

On New Year's Day, a body was discovered on Queen Elizabeth II's estate of Sandringham. The body was identified as Alisa Dmitrijeva, a 17 year old Latvian teenager who had been reported missing since August from her home town of Wisbech in eastern England, about 20 miles away from Sandringham. The death was discovered by a man who was walking his dog in a wooded area in the estate. The estate is mostly used by Queen Elizabeth II and the royal family during the Christmas holidays. While parts of the estate are reserved strictly for members of the royal family, much of the estate is open to the public. The body, found approximately three miles from the royal residence, had been lying at the site for some time. According to police, initial DNA tests based on bone and muscle fragments failed to provide any information about the victim, so the police used tests done on the femur and the victim's palm to determine the victim's identity. Detective Chief Inspector Jes Fry, the lead officer in the case, is treating the death as suspicious and is trying to establish whether any public events took place at the estate since the victim went missing in August.

1. Los Angeles police arrest arson suspect

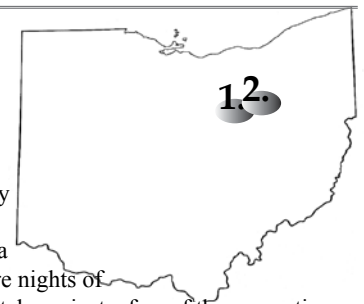
A German 24 year old named Harry Burkhart was arrested for setting fires in the Los Angeles area. He was arrested for setting 52 fires within the greater Los Angeles. The Los Angeles Police Department arrested him on 37 felony arson counts. The total estimated damage from the fires is expected to be \$3 million in property damages. Since the United States government detained his mother due to German arrest warrants before the arson spree began, the fires are linked with some anti-American bitterness. Some reports surfaced stating that Burkhart was heard cursing the U.S. before he set the fires.

2. Alaska town buried in snow

The National Guard was called in to help dig out the residents of Cordova, Alaska. Approximately 18 feet of snow has fallen on the town within the past several weeks. Several buildings have collapsed due to the heavy accumulation of snow. The heavy snow is a concern for Cordova because the town is only accessible by boat or plane. Since the snowfall, the town has declared a state of emergency as the National Guard attempts to clear out some of the snow because the snow dump sites are overflowing. Another concern for the Alaska town is that it is near an avalanche zone, so the snow accumulation may create some nearby avalanches to endanger town residents.

1. Jimmy Dimora trial is underway

Commissioner Jimmy Dimora, a lifelong resident of Cuyahoga County, has dedicated thirty-five years to public service as a city employee, city councilman, mayor, and county commissioner. Dimora was once one of the county's most influential politicians, serving as both a county commissioner and chairman of the county Democratic Party. He is now accused of running a criminal enterprise out of the county Administration Building. According to the FBI investigation, Dimora helped himself to sex on demand with top-dollar call girls, and with a woman who sought his help to get a job. Expensive lunches, a high-flying gambling junket to Las Vegas, and more nights of partying at a Stonebridge condominium overlooking Cleveland's Flats and a a four-figure discount on a Rolex watch are just a few of the accusations against Dimora. Because of the free or deeply-discounted improvements to his \$438,000 home, the court seeks to seize Dimora's house in forfeiture.

2. Rafferty pleads not guilty in Craigslist case

The 16-year-old Stow teen charged in the Craigslist shootings case pleaded not guilty on January 23 in Summit County Juvenile Court to charges of aggravated murder, attempted murder, aggravated robbery and kidnapping. Prosecutors also asked that Brogan Rafferty be tried as an adult and his case be transferred to Summit County Common Pleas Court. Rafferty is accused of being an accomplice in the deaths of three men and the attempted murder of a fourth. He is accused in a scheme that involved a help wanted ad posted online that offered \$300 a week and housing to oversee a farm in Noble County. Prosecutors contend that the job never existed. The victims include David Pauley, 51, of Virginia, who was killed October 23 and whose body was discovered about a month later in Noble County; the body of Timothy Kern, 47, of Massillon, who was killed November 13, was found near Rolling Acres Mall in Akron on November 25; the body of Ralph Geiger, 55, of Atlanta, was found November 25 near where Pauley was buried. Scott David, 48, a former Canton man living in South Carolina, was shot November 6 after arriving at the Noble County location, but escaped and alerted authorities, leading them to the crime scene. Rafferty is being held in the Summit County Jail.

**MRS. HAKIMA BOUHKRISSI from Morocco****MRS. BOUHKRISSI** is the new chemistry teacher.**Tell us about your family in Morocco and in the states.**

I still have family in Morocco; however, two of my sisters, a few cousins, and a brother-in-law are now living in France. I live in Copley with my husband, Dr. Mekki Bayachou, and my three children.

What is your hometown and your educational background?

I was born and raised in Fes, Morocco, a city that is about 120 miles from the Atlantic Ocean on the west and about 180 miles from the Mediterranean Sea on the north. I graduated from the University of Science in Fes with a Bachelor's Degree in Chemistry and a minor in Physics. I then went to pursue graduate studies in France and joined the University of Pierre et Marie Curie in Paris to receive a Diplome d'Etude Approfondies. As a Ph.D. candidate, I was lucky to secure a position at the renowned Ecole Normale Supérieure for research work. I graduated with a Ph.D. in Analytical Chemistry. I then moved to Irvine, California, to join my husband who was a postdoctoral fellow at the University of California at Irvine.

Have you lived any other places?

I lived seven years in France, seven months in Italy, and I have been in the United States for 15 years. We lived five years in California, and then we moved to Cleveland in 2001 when my husband joined the Chemistry Department at Cleveland State University.

What are some important traditions in Morocco?

There are many important traditions in Morocco. First and foremost, the unique touch of hospitality and the almost sacred custom to treat guests with the highest standards is an ancient tradition that is still observed today in both rural and urban areas.

Another important tradition in Morocco is that couscous is the most important dish. Serving couscous is a well-entrenched tradition all over the kingdom of Morocco. Couscous is a colorful dish based on steam-cooked coarse semolina with other vegetables and topped with chicken or beef. The traditional 7-cycle steaming of semolina during the dish preparation is key and is a secret to the delicious taste.

Another tradition in Morocco is serving green tea with fresh mint leaves. Another icon of Morocco is the open market that contributes to the vibrant life in every city or rural community and presents traditional economic and social gatherings. The list of traditions is long and marks every facet of life in Morocco.

What do you miss most about Morocco?

Some of the things that I miss most are family and all of the childhood memories, the freshness of the food, and walking to run errands instead of driving everywhere. I also miss the beautiful Atlas Mountains with its ski resorts during the snow season. (YES, it snows in Morocco.)

What is one of your favorite things about Morocco?

The gorgeous shores of Morocco and the beaches on both the northern Mediterranean Sea and on the western Atlantic Ocean.

What are some of your favorite Moroccan dishes?

I happened to already mention one of them, couscous. Other traditional foods from my hometown include Pastilla, various sorts of Tagines (fish or meat) with seasonal fresh vegetables.

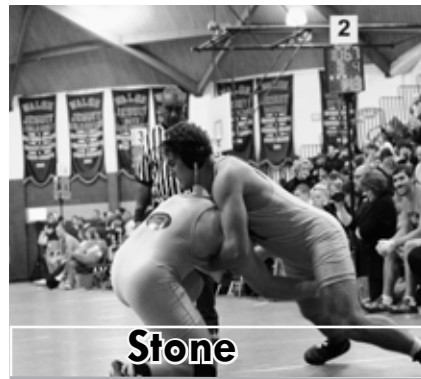
