## Kiss Me, Kate wows the audience

Under the direction of Mr. Geard Neary, the Leprechaun Theatre Guild presented *Kiss Me Kate* on April 25, 26, 27, and 28. *Kiss Me Kate* is a “show within a show” that centers around the acting careers of Fred Graham (Ryan Bennett) and his ex-wife Lilli Vanessi (Olivia Wilde) and their production of Shakespeare’s *The Taming of the Shrew*.

Graham directs, produces, and stars as Petrucchio, in their production, and Vanessi plays the part of Katherine. The divorced couple bickers behind scenes but their characters are the love interest in the production. Lilli becomes jealous when Fred tries to pursue Lois Lane (Maddie Mazzola) who plays Bianca. After the show, Lois’s boyfriend, Bill Calhoun (Marco Colant), who plays Lucentio, told her that when he was gambling, he signed a \$10,000 IOU in Fred’s name.

Before the show opens, Lilli shows Fred her engagement ring from Harrison Howell (Josh Vellequette) and the two reminisce on their past love together. The gangsters (Topher Esker and Andrew Trecaso) show up to collect the \$10,000 from the IOU, but Fred says he never signed it. The gangsters say they will, “give him time to remember,” and leave. Lilli receives flowers from Fred and says she is still in love with him, but Fred intended the flowers to go to Lois. He tries to keep Lilli from reading the card that reveals they were meant for Lois, but she takes it on stage and says she will read it later.

The play begins on stage with Baptista (Josh Vellequette) telling Bianca, his youngest daughter, that she cannot be married before her older sister Kate is. Three men, Lucentio, Hortensio (Brandon Howard), and Gremio (Jack Kelliher) all desire to marry Bianca and hatch a plan for their friend Petrucchio to marry Kate because her father is rich, and then Bianca will also be able to marry as well. Kate, however, has no desire to marry but Petrucchio attempts to charm her anyway.

Offstage, Lilli gets a chance to read the card and becomes furious. She walks onstage during the performance and begins to hit Fred, who tries to remain in character. Baptista gives Petrucchio permission to marry Kate while Lilli continues to hit him. As the scene ends, Lilli declares that she is quitting the show. She is unable to leave, however, because the gangsters have come back and forced her to stay because Fred tells them that if she leaves, he will be unable to pay the \$10,000.

The play resumes and the gangsters are on stage dressed in Shakespearean costumes. Petrucchio and Kate have just been married, and he tries to get Kate to kiss him, but she refuses. The show takes an intermission while the actors relax outside. When the play resumes, Petrucchio is mourning his freedom and attempting to tame Kate. The romantic drama between Lilli, Fred, Lois, Bill, and Harrison expands, while the gangsters are still present and the show is still under way.

The gangsters realize that the IOU is no longer valid because their leader is now dead, and Lilli leaves with Harrison despite Fred’s protests. The show goes on (even without one of the main characters) and just as the show is about to end Lilli shows up again, and she and Fred wordlessly reconcile.

Many students and adults worked countless hours together to make this show a success. Seniors Brianna McVicker and Jordan Weisensell were the stage managers, senior Maddie Beskitt was the dance captain, and freshman Johnathan Wierzbicki was the light master.

**Divided Korea faces crisis**

In March 2012, North Korea announced that it was carrying out tests to create a long-range rocket. The test was conducted a month later against the U.N.'s wishes.

In August 2012, North Korea's young leader Kim Jong Un visited a military unit previously involved in attacks against South Korea, where he reminded the troops to be ready to fight a "sacred war" against Seoul. In October 2012, North Korea announced that it had developed missiles that could reach the U.S.

All of the threats made by Kim reached a new level when he announced that North Korea would no longer adhere to the 1953 armistice that ended the Korean War. This comes at a time when heavy sanctions against North Korea are being implemented by the U.N. and the U.S. sends B-52 bombers to conduct military drills in South Korea.

Tensions between both North and South Korea have been around for some time, and threats between the North and South have been going on as well. Most seem to find it entirely normal that warnings of thermonuclear war, annihilation and utter devastation occur around the same time as U.S. activity is increased in the area.

North Korea also announced that it is targeting the United States' and South Korea's bases. Shortly after these announcements, Pyongyang announced that its Yongbyon nuclear complex would be restarting. Propaganda showing several U.S. buildings, like the White House and the Capitol Building, being blown up by North Korean Forces.

Seoul is 30 miles from the demilitarized zone dividing North and South Korea. If a full-scale war were to break out, the South Korean capital would be Pyongyang's prime target. It might only be minutes before artillery or rockets would come. South Koreans seem to be experienced with these threats and are used to hearing such things. One South Korean citizen, when asked how people felt about the situation, replied by saying "We're insensitive."

"We know North Korea doesn't want war," said another. "They want money and food," adding that Pyongyang has tried it all -- missiles, the nuclear threat, its million man army -- to try to blackmail the South."

North Korea urged all foreign companies and tourists in South Korea to evacuate, saying the two countries are on the verge of nuclear war. Even North Korea's peaceful relations with the South are being shut down by Kim Jong Un. Work at the Kaesong industrial park near its border, which combines South Korean technology and know-how with North Korea's cheap labor, was recently shut down. North Korea pulled out more than 50,000 workers from the complex, the only remaining product of economic co-operation between the two countries that started about a decade ago when relations were slightly friendlier.

The South Korean government, meanwhile, urged Pyongyang to work to resolve the situation through dialogue. "Pyongyang should come to the bargaining table immediately," South Korean Unification Minister Ryoo Kihl-jae yoo said.

In a statement reported Thursday by state-run media, the North Korean government said that what happens at the complex in the coming days "entirely depends on the attitude of the South Korean authorities."

North Korea even raised a missile into the upward firing position in preparation for an attack. A government agency is quoted by the state-run media as saying that "war can break out any moment." After the missile was readied,

but not fired, Ryoo said, "South Korea has been living under such threats from the past, and we are always prepared for it." He called the current climate "a very ordinary situation."

"The United States has made clear many times what the conditions are for our entering talks and they haven't changed," Secretary of State John Kerry said during an interview with CNN's Jill Dougherty in Tokyo. "The conditions have to be met where the North has to move towards denuclearization, indicate a seriousness in doing so by reducing these threats, stop the testing, and indicate it's actually prepared to negotiate," he said.

According to Kerry, the U.S. Government is uncertain as to how advanced North Korea's nuclear weapons program is, but they do not believe it has the capability of launching a nuclear attack. Whether or not North Korea is actually willing to carry out an attack is another thing. While they certainly talk as if they are prepared to do this at any time, threats have been going on for a long time and no actual attacks have been made.

# Police interrogate Boston Marathon suspect

On Monday April 15, tragedy struck at the Boston Marathon when two bombs exploded at the finish line. On the city's 238th annual Patriots' Day, these bombs killed 3 and injured more than 260 people. The bombs were shrapnel bombs, which when detonated, explode and release explosive items such as broken glass, nails, and shards of metal. These bombs were put in ordinary 1.6-gallon pressure cookers, one with shards of metal and the other with nails and were left on the ground in black duffel bags. As a result of the attack, seven people had amputations of which two remain in critical condition.

Bomb suspects are Tamerlan Tsarnaev, 26, who was killed in a shootout and his younger brother Dzhokhar Tsarnaev, 19. The brothers were originally from Russia and have been living in the United States for the past decade. In 2012 Tamerlan visited Russia for about six months where authorities speculate he engaged in terrorist activities with a radical group of Muslims. After this trip he started to post videos on YouTube about radical ideas. During this time the FBI, CIA, and Russia intelligence flagged him as a possible Muslim radical.

After the events of the bombings, the brothers returned to the normalcy of their everyday lives. Dzhokhar returned to school and was just acting depressed said friends. Things began to unravel when a surveillance video was released and the two brothers were identified. The brothers were attempting to escape the inevitable manhunt that ensued shortly after. As part of their escape, they murdered a MIT police officer,



Sean Collier, 26, while he was sitting in his cruiser. Next, they proceeded to carjack a Mercedes SUV at gunpoint and told the owner of the car that they were responsible for the bombings. The owner escaped unharmed from the car approximately a half an hour later while getting gas for his car.

The suspects then returned to the stolen SUV and drove toward Watertown which is about eight miles from downtown Boston. Police officers chased the two despite having explosive devices thrown at them from the suspects' stolen cars. Tamerlan and a police officer were injured during the gun fight. Tamerlan eventually died at a hospital. Meanwhile, Dzhokhar escaped in the stolen car, accidentally running over his brother.

Dzhokhar stopped in Watertown, abandoned the SUV, and hid in a boat under a tarp behind a resident's house. The police continued their manhunt by searching all the residents' houses in the area. Residents were finally allowed to go outside when one resident went to his backyard and saw that the tarp on his boat didn't look right.

When he went over to fix it, he saw Dzhokhar's bloody body lying in his boat and alerted police. After a standoff with police, they finally apprehended Dzhokhar, and he was sent to a nearby hospital for his wounds.

Recently, after questioning Dzhokhar, he told them they were on their way to New York to launch an attack there as well. Dzhokhar is now considered a terrorist who will be charged with using weapons of mass destruction and malicious destruction of property. He has been sent to the Bureau of Prisons facility FMC Devens at Ft. Devens, Massachusetts where police will continue to interrogate him about the massacre.

# Rocket Team goes to Alabama for NASA finals

On Tuesday April 16, the STVM student body gathered in the gym for yet another send-off. This time, however, it wasn't for a state competition, it was for a national competition between high schools and universities across the U.S. The Rocket Team traveled in a large van with a trailer attached (carrying the rocket) to Alabama to compete with other teams and interact with NASA employees.

The STVM Rocket Team initially became involved in this project by placing in the top twenty nationally in the Team America Rocketry Challenge in Washington D.C. last year.

The students involved in building the rocket and working on the NASA project were seniors Gerry Puhalla, Stefan Subich, Logan Wilkinson, Stephen Hall; juniors Hannah Norris, Katie Engels, Jack Giles, Lucia Vinzani, Julianne Stamer, Alex Morley; sophomore Ryan Schweter; and freshman Steven Stamer. The team was led by science chairperson Mr. Robert Engels who was assisted by engineer Mr. Jerome Appenzeller. They tested the rocket at fields in Amherst and Middlefield, Ohio, as well as Mr. Engels' house and classroom. They worked on building the rocket, collecting data from experiments, and writing papers to send to NASA.

The requirements for the rocket were numerous. Some included the



rocket had to carry a scientific payload and had to reach an altitude of one mile.

The STVM Rocket Team was able to take part in this with the financial help of major sponsors Timken and Bridgestone as well as a grant from NASA and donations from STVM and the Ohio Space Consortium.

A total of 21 high schools and 38 universities competed in this event, and STVM launched a flight which impressed the NASA engineers.

Mr Engels, Rocket Team coach, commented, "This endeavor was a lot more challenging and a lot more work than we thought, but this made finishing that much more fulfilling. Plus we love flying those big rockets."

Team member Stefan Subich said, "The project was much more challenging than expected, but it was a valuable experience, showing what is involved in the engineering process. There were challenging moments and difficulties, but the team endured through them. Not only did we learn about engineering, but we also became a family, forming unforgettable friendships with unforgettable memories."


